The commission's historic calendars were on sale, and the society handed out membership and program information. Who's Who? — Historical Commission vs Historic District Commission vs Historical Society

Identity Crisis

It's a matter of **Identity Crisis!** Town residents are often stymied by the myriad of historical groups and their various roles. Phillipston is no different.

The Historical Society of Phillipston, Inc. is a private, non-profit corporation. It is tax-exempt and has been awarded a 501 c(3) designation by the IRS, which means donations to the society can be deducted from the donor's personal income taxes. The purpose of the society is to cultivate and encourage an interest in the history of Phillipston. The society holds monthly educational programs and can acquire and preserve important artifacts as well as establish a society building and museum.

The Historical Commission is the part of town government responsible for community-wide historic preservation planning. The commission compiles an inventory of historic properties; nominates properties for the historic register; comments on state or federal projects that might impact on the town's historical resources (highway widening, new school location, etc.); and also advises town officials and boards on matters that affect these historic resources (zoning changes, the re-use of the town-owned historic buildings, preservation of historic landscapes, etc.).

If a town has a historic district, the **Historic District Commission is the regulatory body for design reviews within the historic district.** Phillipston's historic district is called the Phillipston Center Historic Area and includes the houses and buildings

surrounding the common and within a little more than one-half a mile from the meeting-house (the current Congregational Church). When the historic area was established in 1995, the town elected to **not require regulatory design reviews**, so the town does not have a Historic District Commission.

Working Together

The Historical Commission is one of the Society's most important partners. Through the Commission, the Society has access to state and federal funding for the preservation of buildings and artifacts. Private funding authorities also want to see the town's historical commission supportive of any society programs that they would fund.

In Phillipston, almost all members of the historical commission are members of the historical society. Last fall, the society and the commission teamed to promote our activities and programs. We had booths at the Pumpkin Festival, the Red Apple Farm's
